



THE EARLY YEARS: FOUNDATIONS OF POLICING (1961–1979)

1961

- Bhutan begins its first Five-Year Plan.
- Law and order were managed by civil administrators and the Royal Bhutan Army.
- A need for a dedicated police force was strongly felt.



1st September 1965 — Birth of the RBP

- By royal command of His Majesty Jigme Dorji Wangchuck, the Royal Bhutan Police is established with 555 personnel.
- Guided by HRH Prince Namgyal Wangchuck (Paro Penlop)
- Dunga Bap Dada appointed Head of Police in the South
- Police Raising Day is celebrated every year on 1st September.

1966

- First Bhutanese officers -Lieut. Karma Gayleg & Lieut, Lal Bahadur Basnet - sent for Indian Police Service training.


VISION 2030 FUTURE READY POLICING

A LIFETIME OF SERVICE

Bhutan's first IPS trained officer

Amid the lush rice fields and prayer flags of Tsirang, Lal Bahadur nurtured a simple yet powerful dream—to serve the King, Country, and People. That dream began to take shape in the mid-1950s when he earned a government scholarship to Kalimpong, India—a hub of learning for Bhutanese students of the time.

Inspired by His Majesty the Third Druk Gyalpo's vision, Lal Bahadur returned determined to give back. He joined the Royal Bhutan Army, trained under Indian instructors in Haa, and in 1965, stood among 555 selected to form the newly established Royal Bhutan Police.

A Himalayan Trailblazer



EARLY YEARS IN UNIFORM

Handpicked by HRH Namgyal Wangchuck, he and Late Dasho Karma Galek were sent to the Central Police Training College (CPTC) in Mount Abu, Rajasthan—the same institution that trains India's elite Indian Police Service (IPS) officers. The experience had been both humbling and intense.

"We trained day and night—in law enforcement, crime prevention, forensics, tactical drills, even horse riding," he recalls. "Our drill instructor, Spadigam, was ruthless but brilliant. He demanded the best—and unknowingly, shaped me to lead."

Following six months of hands-on police duty in Madhya Pradesh, he returned to Bhutan with a fire to serve. He trained the 8th batch of RBP officers and proudly stood among them as they passed out—not just as their commander, but as a mentor who believed in their potential.

Guarding the Nation with Heart

He later served as Officer-in-Charge at Chuzom Check Post, ensuring road safety, managing disaster responses, and keeping the peace. Eventually, he was entrusted with VIP and VVIP security, coordinating high-level protection for Royal family members and international dignitaries—a career highlight he still cherishes deeply.

Message to the Future Police Personnel:

"Lead with integrity.

Speak with respect. Think critically. Train your body and mind. The path is tough, but the honour is unmatched."

NEW INITIATIVES AND POLICY UPDATES

WHY NDPS TESTING



RBP'S NATIONWIDE ADVOCACY DRIVE: BUILDING A SAFER BHUTAN.

From bustling towns to remote villages, the Royal Bhutan Police is taking proactive steps to empower citizens with knowledge and strengthen trust through impactful awareness campaigns. Over the past two months, a wave of sensitization programs has swept across Bhutan, targeting students, monks, business owners, drivers, and parents—with one clear message:

'Safety is a shared responsibility.'

GRASSROOTS IMPACT: POLICE AT YOUR DOORSTEP

RBP's Mobile Community Policing (MCP) reached far-flung gewogs like Laya and Shenga Bjimi, where officers:

- Taught fire safety during monsoon.
- Warned against counterfeit currency and online scams.
- Encouraged Neighborhood Watch programs to deter burglaries.

"We feel safer knowing police are just a call away," shared a villager in Trashiyangtse.

GUARDIANS OF THE DHARMA: MONKS JOIN THE FIGHT AGAINST CRIME

In historic dratshangs like Dechen Phodrang and Gangteng, over 500 monks learned about:

- **Discipline & Law** Their role as moral leaders in crime prevention.
- Protecting Sacred Sites Preventing theft and vandalism of religious artifacts.
- Social Media Pitfalls The dangers of misuse, including "Tiktoking in robes."

YOUTH AT THE FOREFRONT: SHAPING TOMORROW'S LEADERS

Over 5,000 students from schools and colleges engaged in interactive sessions on:

- Cyber Safety How to spot scams and avoid digital traps.
- **Drug Laws** Harsh realities of substance abuse and legal consequences.
- Gender Sensitivity Understanding consent and combating sexual violence.

"Prevention is better than cure," echoed SSP Division VI at Tsirang's youth camp, inspiring students to make informed choices.

SECTOR-SPECIFIC CRACKDOWNS

- Fuel Stations: Phuentsholing businesses trained to thwart fuel smuggling and enhance fire safety.
- Taxi Drivers: Yangtse operators pledged zero tolerance for drunk driving and overloading.
- **Bolero Drivers:** Gelephu's transport workers underwent drug tests and road safety drills.

A UNIFIED CALL TO ACTION

With His Majesty's vision as the guiding light, RBP's initiatives are more than just awareness—they're a movement. "Crime prevention begins with you," urged DCOP COD at Phobjikha's mass gathering of 463 attendees.

NEW INITIATIVES AND POLICY UPDATES

ENHANCED PUBLIC SAFETY THROUGH PORTABLE CCTV INITIATIVE

The Royal Bhutan Police is taking crime prevention to the next level with its new Portable CCTV Program. This initiative combines cutting-edge technology with comprehensive training to create safer communities across Bhutan.



WHAT THIS MEANS FOR PUBLIC SAFETY

- Strategic Surveillance Deployment: Portable CCTV units are being installed in crime hotspots, at public events, and across remote areas
- Trained Professionals at Work: various police personnel across the field divisions have completed intensive hands-on training.
- **Proven Crime Deterrent:** These systems have already shown success during investigations.

BEHIND THE SCENES:

- Officers trained in proper logbook maintenance
- Strict chain-of-custody protocols established
- Real-case scenario simulations conducted

"This program reflects our commitment to His Majesty's vision of a secure Bhutan," Crime and Operations Department. "The public can feel safer knowing these additional eyes are helping protect our communities."

NDOVU OFFICE INAUGURATED AT PARO AIRPORT TO STRENGTHEN ANTI-DRUG EFFORTS

On 25th July 2025, the Deputy Chief of Police (Crime and Operations) inaugurated the new Narcotic Drugs and Other Vices Unit (NDOVU) office at Paro International Airport, emphasizing enhanced vigilance against drug trafficking. The event, attended by officials from the Department of Air Transport (DoAT), Division-I, and NDOVD, included a briefing on combating drug smuggling. A stakeholder meeting with representatives from DoAT, BCAA, Customs, Immigration, BFDA, and airlines reinforced inter-agency collaboration, with discussions on refining NDOVU's Standard Operating Procedures to secure the airport from illicit activities. The collective resolve was reaffirmed to safeguard the nation's interests under TSA Wa Sum.



TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT INITIATIVE



During the second week of August, the Traffic Division has intensified enforcement against unsafe overtaking and reckless driving for 7 days. The Highway Flying Squad used mobile cameras (on bikes, police, and private cars) to monitor violations. Additional personnel will ensure strict compliance with all traffic rules.

TRAININGS



RBP Enhances Community Safety with Stop & Frisk Initiative

RBP's Division XI trained 58 officers/NCOs on July 7 in standardized Stop & Frisk protocols, combining legal theory with practical techniques.

Following the training, Division XI deployed teams for night patrols during summer break. Officers engaged suspicious youths with professional frisking and guidance to prevent late-night risks, combining crime prevention with community outreach for safer neighborhoods.



Fire Safety Training Conducted at Wangditse Lhakhang

Fire and Rescue Services Division (FRSD) trained Wangditse Lhakhang staff in fire hose/extinguisher use on 09th July 2025. Pending pump repairs, the team will return to complete hydrant system training, ensuring full preparedness to protect this important heritage site.





Capacity Building Training for Security Personnel of RMA



RBP is conducted a 3-day security training (24-26 July) for RMA's 14 personnel, covering surveillance, emergency response, firearms handling, and fire safety. Led by 4 RBP experts and opened by Governor Dasho Penjore, the program combines theory with practical drills to strengthen protection of vital financial infrastructure.

RBP Strengthens Financial Accountability Through Sensitization Meeting

The Royal Bhutan Police launched a two-day sensitization program on July 11 for Field Division Accountants from all 18 LC holder divisions, following audit findings of fund misuse. The session, opened by DCoP (Admin & Finance), reinforced financial discipline, procurement compliance (PRR 2025), and accountability measures, with presentations on audit lapses and corrective actions. This initiative underscores RBP's commitment to transparent and responsible financial management.

Procurement Awareness Program

RBP hosted a procurement awareness session on 22 July for 84 personnel, covering PRR-2025, eGP, and e-Tools implementation. The training strengthened understanding of modern procurement systems among officers and staff.

TRAININGS

Fire Safety Training Conducted for RMA Security Personnel



FRSD trained 9 RMA security staff in fire safety on 24 July, covering fire theory, prevention, and hands-on extinguisher use. The 45-minute session strengthened emergency response capabilities at the vital installation.



Fire Safety Training Conducted for Royal Thimphu College.



Fire and Rescue Services Department conducted a comprehensive fire safety and prevention advocacy session for 38 student leaders of RTC, covering theoretical and practical demonstrations, including the fire triangle, fire classification, types and operation methods of fire extinguishers, fire prevention measures, a live fire extinguisher demonstration, and an LPG fire extinguishing demonstration, submitted for your kind information.





Strengthening Fire Safety Measures at Phuentsholing Pedestrian Terminal



Field Drug Testing Training

On 22nd July 2025, NDOVD and BFDA jointly conducted a Field Drug Testing training at NDOVD Conference Hall from 0900-1200 hrs, attended by 11 NDOVD personnel and 2 Paro Airport police. The session covered practical testing techniques, safety protocols, and legal procedures through theory, live demonstrations, precautionary measures, enhancing skills participants' in accurate substance identification and handling. This collaboration strengthens drug enforcement capabilities.

Fire safety measures at Phuentsholing's Pedestrian Terminal was strengthened through stakeholder meetings and training. Key agencies coordinated on risk assessments, monthly drills, and equipment checks. Over 150 immigration and police personnel underwent hands-on firefighting training, culminating in a successful mock drill on August 1. The initiative highlighted improved emergency response while identifying areas for further refinement in safety protocols.

Mindfulness in Uniform:

How RBP is Redefining Policing for Gelephu's New Era



Under the visionary guidance of His Majesty The King, something deeply transformative is unfolding within the RBP training grounds. This is not just a course. It's a calling. A bold new training program, crafted specifically for the Gelephu Mindfulness City, is turning 303 recruits into mindful guardians of a modern Bhutan.

A CURRICULUM DESIGNED WITH VISION

The indoors curriculum of the first five month covers three profound subject areas:

- Legal Studies: Practical law enforcement knowledge
- Police Science: From investigation, digital literacy and forensics to tactical deployment and urban policing—recruits learn to navigate the complexity of a modern city with confidence.
- Social Science: Where it all comes together—mental resilience, emotional intelligence, leadership, human rights, and public service etiquette.

After the five-month basic course, recruits shall undergo **two months of specialization** in six mission-critical areas:


- 1. Fire and Rescue Service; 2. Critical Infrastructure and VIP Security;
- 3. Emergency Response and Disaster Management;
- 4. Public Order Management and Riot Control;
- 5. Traffic Management and Enforcement; and
- 6. Prison

When I first arrived in Bhutan, what caught my attention wasn't just the breathtaking mountains—it was the visible, approachable presence of the Royal Bhutan Police.


What impresses him the most? The small, often overlooked details- Spotless uniforms, carefully tended rose gardens, and the way police personnel carry themselves with pride.

"You can tell a lot about a force by how they carry themselves, and the RBP does it with pride," he adds.

From his global lens, Bhutan's approach to policing feels like a breath of fresh air.

"In cities like New York, community policing only picked up recently" he recalls. "But in Thimphu, you see officers walking the streets, engaging with people—not just enforcing rules but building relationships."

Mr. William Bill, USA



Mr. William Bill, an international chef instructor from the United States, has been living and working in Bhutan as part of the DSP Skilling Program. With an impressive background that includes serving at the White House under two U.S. Presidents and working alongside the U.S. Armed Forces, his insights come from a deep well of experience, discipline, and global perspective.

More importantly, he praises the RBP for the way they interact with the public—with empathy, calmness, and strength. He recounts a personal incident where he was stopped for a traffic violation.

"The officer was firm, yes, but never confrontational. That's true professionalism."

FEATURE:

On Duty, On Paws: Meet the Dogs Behind RBP Operations

From four paws to forty—RBP's Canine Unit has come a long way since it was first set up in 1983 with just four dogs and handlers trained in India. Their first mission? Tracking escaped prisoners and finding missing persons.

Today, with 40 trained dogs and 38 dedicated handlers stationed across Bhutan, the Canine Unit plays a vital role in:

- Detecting narcotics, explosives, and tobacco
- Tracking criminals and missing persons

A BOND BEYOND DUTY



Handler Peljab Cheki Dorji and Labrador 'Karma' have worked side-by-side for 4 years.

"In one operation, Bobby detected drugs hidden inside a fuel tank. He just sat down and looked at me. I knew he had found something," Peljab Cheki recalls.

Handlers feed, train, and care for their dogs daily—building trust that can't be faked. But challenges remain, from limited training tools to kennel budgets.

★ DID YOU KNOW?

- Police dogs can distinguish individual human scents—even days after a person has left the scene.
- A Labrador's nose has up to 300 million scent receptors. A human? Just 5 million.
- **®** RBP dogs can detect explosives, narcotics, tobacco, and even track lost persons.
- £ Each RBP handler is paired with one dog—building long-term trust and teamwork.

TRAINING, TEAMWORK & TRUST



"A confident handler makes a confident dog."

RBP also sends selected handlers abroad for upskilling—bringing back techniques that strengthen the whole Unit.

REAL CASES, REAL IMPACT: RBP'S CANINE UNIT IN ACTION

The Canine Unit has played a crucial role in solving several high-profile cases:

- Wangbama: A trained dog followed a footprint trail that led straight to a suspect's hideout, where stolen goods were recovered.
- A Paro: A dog sniffed out stolen items buried deep in a forest.
- Thimphu: Near Memorial Chorten, a detection dog uncovered narcotics stashed in a car trunk.

These are just a few examples of how RBP's dogs are not just partners—but vital assets in law enforcement operations.



Online SCC Application (via Bhutan NDI App)

Step 1: Install Bhutan NDI App

Step 2: Visit scs.rbp.gov.ht

Step 3: Click "Application" \rightarrow Enter CID \rightarrow click on "check your name" to save \rightarrow select your DOB \rightarrow Choose SCC Type (General/Election/Arms)

Step 4: Submit!

NOTE: X Election/Arms License denied if past criminal record exists.



To Track Application Status

Enter CID + DOB \rightarrow Check approval progress (no NDI login needed).

★ DON'T MISS THIS!

- Certificate is valid for 1 year from date of issue
- You may renew 1 month before expiry
- If your current SCS needs to be valid for a longer period, contact ICT Division.

QUICK RECAP

- ✓ Use Bhutan NDI App
- Your online SCC must be approved first before applying for a paper-based version.
- SCC is Valid for 1 year
 - For Paper-based SCC, Biometrics is needed (above 7- 8 yrs)



Paper-Based SCC (For Ex-Country Use)
