AFIS NOW INSTALLED IN EVERY DZONGKHAG *Fingerprint Services at Your Doorstep*

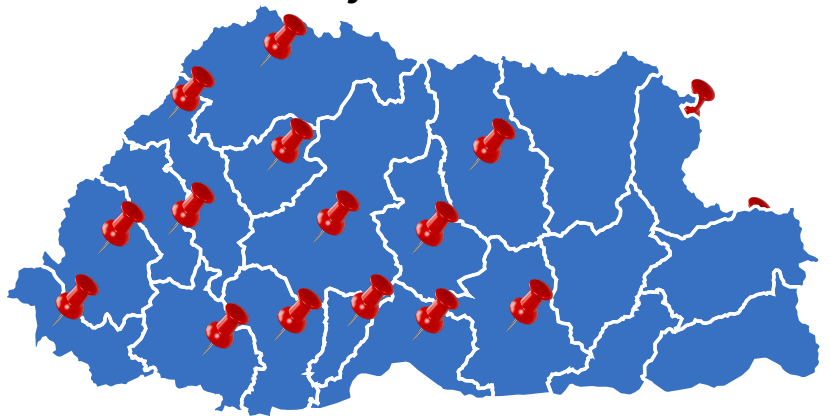

STRENGTHENING SAFETY THROUGH BHUTAN–ZURICH PARTNERSHIP



From 16–18 October 2025, His Excellency Mario Fehr, Minister of the Department of Security of the Canton of Zurich, and Mr. Lars Mulli, Director, visited the Royal Bhutan Police to further advance long-standing cooperation in fire safety and road safety.

The delegation formally handed over ten three-tiered extension ladders to the Fire and Rescue Service Division and observed practical demonstrations at the FRSD Container Training Facility.

They also met the Chief of Police to discuss ongoing projects and future areas of collaboration, including the development of a volunteer fire brigade.

The delegates visited the Traffic Division to see modern enforcement equipment supported under the partnership, followed by a live demonstration at Namseling. They also inspected fire safety installations at Wangduephodrang Dzong and commended the strong preparedness measures in place.

The RBP expresses deep appreciation to the Canton of Zurich for its continued support since 2015, which has significantly strengthened Bhutan's fire response, emergency readiness, and traffic management systems.



NEW INITIATIVES

INAUGURATION OF ICP GASHARIBALEY STRENGTHENS EASTERN BHUTAN'S BORDER MANAGEMENT



The Integrated Check Post (ICP) at Gasharibaley, Nganglam, was formally inaugurated and handed over to the Integrated Check Post Management Division. Located along the Gyalposhing, Nganglam highway in Pemagatshel Dzongkhag, which borders Assam, the operational ICP fills a critical security and monitoring gap in a region that serves as a vital lifeline for five eastern districts.

ESTABLISHMENT OF NDOVD PHUENTSHOLING & APPOINTMENT OF SP

The Office of NDOVD, Phuentsholing, was formally inaugurated on 15th October 2025 by the SSP, Division III. This new office will henceforth oversee the NDLEU (Narcotic Drugs and Law Enforcement Unit) and NDLEC (Narcotic Drugs Law Enforcement Cell) offices across the four southern regions: Chukha, Samtse, Sarpang, and Samdrup Jongkhar.



PUNAKHA POLICE STATION CONDUCTS SEARCH AND RESCUE TRAINING



A three day in house Search and Rescue (SAR) training was successfully conducted by the Punakha PS rescue team for the personnel of the Khuruthang traffic unit and Lobesa Community Police.

The primary objective of this training was to enhance the preparedness of personnel at the district level to effectively respond to various emergencies.

As a core part of the preparedness plan, the trained personnel from the Lobesa Community Post and the Khuruthang traffic unit will now act as first responders during emergency incidents within their jurisdiction, ensuring quicker and more effective initial action.

PRISON SERVICES DIVISION COMPLETE RIOT CONTROL DRILL TRAINING

The two-day Riot Control Drill training for the personnel of PSD Chamgang successfully concluded today, with a total participation of 107 personnel.

TRAININGS

Capacity Building Training on Forensic Toxicology and Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances



A two day Capacity Building Training on Forensic Toxicology and Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS), organized by the Crime and Operations Department, commenced today, 8th September 2025, at the RBP Headquarters for 21 officers nationwide. The program, designed to enhance investigative skills and law enforcement capacity in drug-related cases, is being conducted on a voluntary basis by Dr. R. K. Gupta, a retired Deputy Director with 38 years of experience from the State Forensic Science Laboratory, Chhattisgarh, India.

115 NLCS Officials Complete Integrated Training Programme

A total of 115 officials from the National Land Commission Secretariat (NLCS) successfully completed the 21day Integrated Training Programme (the 18th batch conducted by the SRPF) at the SRPF & National Search and Rescue Training Centre (NSARTC), Tashi Gatshel. The training, designed to instill discipline, foster teamwork, and nurture unity among NLCS staff to strengthen professional values and institutional cohesion, concluded today with a closing ceremony graced by the Secretary of the National Land Commission.



RBP Concludes Advanced Document Examination Training



The Royal Bhutan Police, in collaboration with the Office of the Austrian Honorary Consul, successfully concluded a three day Advanced Document Security and Examination Training from 24th to 26th September 2025 at RBP Headquarters. Led by Austrian expert Mr. Markus Senfter, the training attended by 15 officers from various divisions built on the first session held in April and further strengthened RBP's skills in document authentication, international best practices, and fraud detection. The closing ceremony was graced by the Deputy Chief of Police (COD) and officials from the Austrian Consulate, marking an important step in enhancing investigative capability and professional excellence within the organisation.

RBP officers Completes Training on Investigation of Cyber Crime Against Women and Children.

Five officers from the Royal Bhutan Police successfully completed a week-long course on "Investigation of Cyber Crime Against Women, Children, and Their Safety Related Issues" at the Central Detective Training Institute (CDTI), Hyderabad, from 10 to 14th November 2025, under the Government of India's Project Tied Assistance (PTA) framework.

Six officers from the Royal Bhutan Police (RBP) have completed a ten day training program on "Social Media Monitoring and Investigation" at the North Eastern Police Academy (NEPA), Meghalaya (12 to 21 November 2025), under the Government of India's Project Tied Assistance (PTA).

The program provides practical training on the evolving landscape of social media crime, digital forensics, AI in monitoring, and cybersecurity to strengthen the officers' competence for effective digital investigations.



93rd INTERPOL General Assembly Opens in Marrakech



The 93rd INTERPOL General Assembly, held from 24 to 27 November 2025 in Marrakech, Morocco, brought together representatives from all 196 member countries under the theme "Connecting the World for a Safer Future."

The meeting focused on strengthening global cooperation against cybercrime, terrorism, and organized crime, with discussions on dismantling scam centres, enhancing policing capabilities, advancing women in policing, reviewing the Silver Notice pilot, and encouraging ratification of the UN Convention Against Cybercrime.

The Assembly remains a key platform for shaping international security priorities and law enforcement collaboration.

TRAININGS

RBP Officers Commence Advanced Scientific Investigation Training



Twenty officers of the Royal Bhutan Police (RBP) have commenced a two-week specialized training program on "Advanced Scientific Investigation" at the Central Detective Training Institute (CDTI), Hyderabad, from 24th November to 5th December 2025, funded by the Government of India under the PTA framework.

The intensive program focuses on the "Science of Investigation," covering crucial areas such as Forensic Psychology, DNA Profiling, Forensic Ballistics, Cybercrime & Digital Forensics, Financial Crimes, and Cross-Border Crime Cooperation, with participants scheduled to visit top scientific laboratories to enhance their practical knowledge.

Five officers from the Royal Bhutan Police (RBP) are attending a three-day specialized training course on the Investigation of Cryptocurrency and Dark Web Crimes (01-03 December 2025) at the Central Detective Training Institute (CDTI), Jaipur.

Funded by the Government of India under the Project Tied Assistance (PTA) framework, this collaborative program with Indian participants is aimed at strengthening the capabilities of investigators in both countries to respond effectively to emerging cyber-enabled threats. The RBP appreciates the Government of India's continued support for law-enforcement capacity building.

RBP Personnel Undergo CBT & SEL Training for Child-Centered Justice



An intensive week-long training on Cognitive Behaviour Therapy (CBT) and Social Emotional Learning (SEL) was successfully conducted for police personnel at the Youth Development Rehabilitation Center (YDRC) from 25th-30th November 2025, through a collaboration between Nazhoen Lamtoen and the Royal Bhutan Police (RBP), with support from UNICEF Bhutan.

This crucial training strengthens the RBP's capacity to adopt a trauma-informed and child-centered approach, equipping police personnel who act as first responders and daily caregivers with vital skills. Participants learned how thoughts, emotions, and behaviours are connected, along with strategies for stress management, communicating with empathy, and creating a safe, supportive environment to guide young people toward healing, responsibility, and resilience.

The Royal Bhutan Police extends its duty beyond borders in the pursuit of peace.

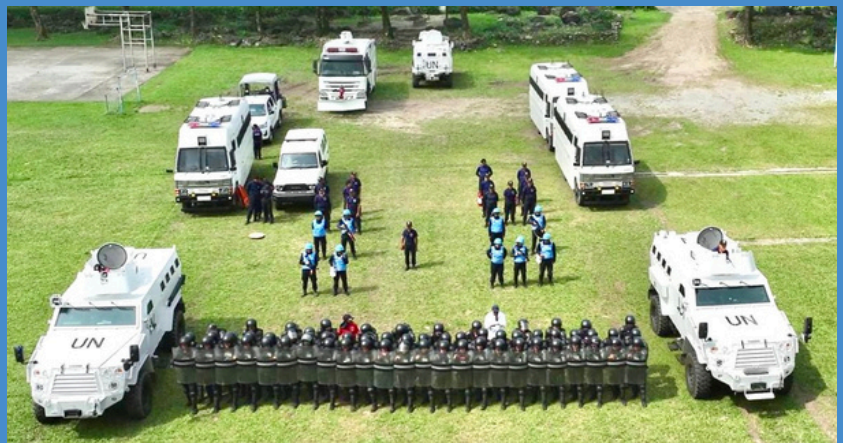
Far from home, under the blue flag of the United Nations, the RBP has extended its service to the cause of global peace. What began as a duty to protect harmony within Bhutan now reaches communities across the world, where RBP personnel help rebuild safety, trust, and hope.



His Majesty The King graciously grants audience to the inaugural deployment of Royal Bhutan Police officers for the Individual Police Officer mission.

Since 2014, more than a hundred RBP officers and NCO/ORs have taken part in UN peacekeeping, serving as Individual Police Officers (IPOs) in post-conflict regions, as seconded officers at the UN Headquarters in New York, and soon as part of Bhutan's own Druk Formed Police Unit (DFPU). Each role represents a different facet of Bhutan's contribution to the international family of peacekeepers.

The DFPU, established under Royal Command in 2017, has already achieved Level III in the UN Peacekeeping Capability Readiness System, a remarkable milestone that brings Bhutan one step closer to deploying its first formed police contingent abroad. With 160 trained police persons and an exceptional 40.63% female representation, the DFPU reflects the RBP's growing strength, discipline, and inclusivity.

16 officers and one NCO shall be deployed soon to the United Nations Peacekeeping Mission in South Sudan. Through these experiences, RBP persons not only serve the world - they also bring the world's lessons home. They return with broader perspectives, sharper skills, and deeper empathy, enriching the way policing is practiced across Bhutan. Guided by the noble vision of His Majesty The King, the Royal Bhutan Police remains steadfast in its duty, to serve with integrity, to uphold peace with compassion, and to represent Bhutan with humility and honor on the global stage.

FROM WORDS TO EVIDENCE: THE TRUTH NOW HAS A LAB

Bhutan's justice system takes a historic leap from confessions to forensic science.

For decades, Bhutan's justice system leaned on confessions to solve crimes. But confessions can be coerced, unreliable, and unfair. Many lives were caught in limbo as cases dragged on, waiting for forensic results from abroad.

That chapter is over. On 23 November 2023, the Royal Bhutan Police inaugurated the Forensic Science Laboratory (FSL) at Serbithang, Thimphu, a turning point that moved Bhutan from confession-based policing to science led justice.

SCIENCE AT THE SERVICE OF JUSTICE

Inside the state of the art facility, evidence speaks louder than words.

- DNA profiling, fingerprint lifting, and digital forensics ensure accuracy.
- Cyber Crime experts analyze phones, computers, and digital trails, exposing hidden truths.
- CCTV integration cross-checks witness statements and timelines.
- Plans for a national DNA database will link suspects to unresolved crimes, strengthening crime detection like never before.

WHY IT MATTERS

- **Justice Delayed, No More:** Evidence no longer waits months for results overseas. Investigations are faster, sharper, and credible.
- **Innocence Protected:** In one past case, a young man spent five months in custody until foreign forensic tests proved his innocence. With the FSL, such injustices can now be prevented.
- **Millions Saved:** In just 20 months, the lab has processed 103 DNA cases, saving the nation over Nu. 8.5 million in overseas courier and analysis costs.

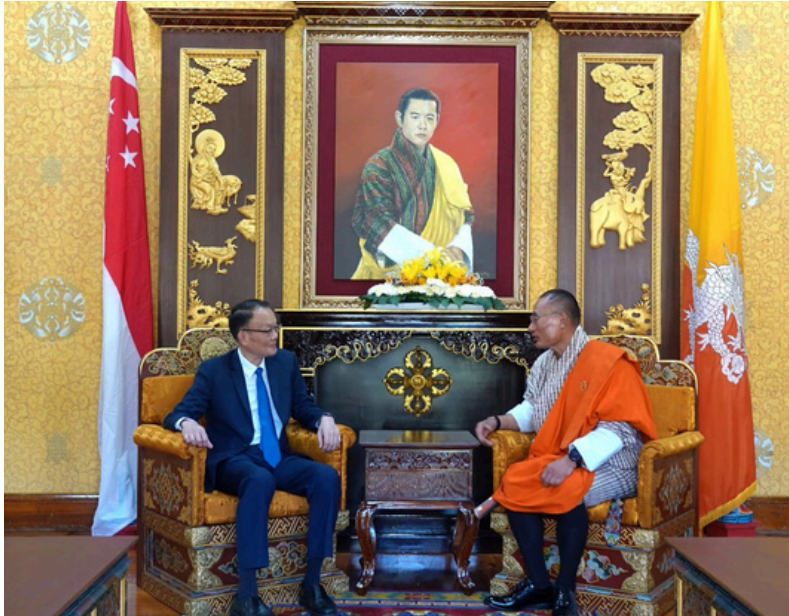
A NEW ERA FOR BHUTAN
